Welcome!

Thank you for your recent inquiry. Memphis Union Mission offers a long-term, Bible-based alcohol and drug recovery program which uses material designed for use in a correctional setting. Our program is offered without charge to our clients.

It is the Mission's aim to serve our clients by helping them overcome life issues through Biblical means, which will prepare them to transition back to a free society. It is also the Mission's aim to serve the courts who refer clients to us by providing clients with structure and reporting regularly on their progress.

Our Iron-On-Iron recovery program has four phases:

- The Intake Phase is normally a one week adjustment period to see if you are able to cooperate and abide by the program expectations.
- The Awareness Phase normally lasts approximately 23 days. Your day at the Men's Emergency Shelter will include chores and Bible study.
- The Calvary Colony Phase takes place at our Calvary Colony facility, where you will complete seven months of one-on-one Biblical counseling, attend various classes, and perform assigned chores.
- The Transitional Phase is eligible for men who've graduated from the program at Calvary Colony. While in transition, you will adjust to a working environment and begin exhibiting financial responsibility. To maintain eligibility in the transitional program, you must comply with all program requirements. Normally you will be in this phase for at least six months.

In order to apply to the Mission's Iron-On-Iron program, you must submit a completed application packet. A completed application packet includes:

- Completed Iron-On-Iron application
- 10-page autobiography of your life
- Copies of your medical and mental health records
- Waiver of employment for nine months
- Memorandum of understanding with referring agency

You must make arrangements with Randy Daniels, the intake pastor, for a phone interview within 10 days after sending in your application packet. You can reach Randy at (901) 526-8434 ext. 1008.

If you are accepted into the Iron-On-Iron recovery program, an acceptance letter will be sent to the contact person at the facility where you reside. Therefore, be sure to include the proper contact information on the completed application packet.

IRON-ON-IRON RECOVERY PROGRAM INTAKE APPLICATION

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Program Overview

The Iron-on-Iron program is a long-term, Christ-centered residential recovery program for addicted men who truly desire to change. The program is conducted on three different sites in the Memphis area. Its purpose is to give men an opportunity to leave addictive lifestyles for healthy, functional relationships with God, themselves and others. Its focus is on applied Christianity for the healing of the total person, recovery from life-controlling substances and preparation for successful living.

Residents receive a unique blend of Christian discipleship, chapel services, class work, work therapy, recreational therapy, vocational development, individual, group and family counseling. GED and tutorial services are provided for residents lacking high school diplomas.

Application Procedures and Requirements

- Candidates for admission must thoroughly complete this application and mail/fax it to the Intake Pastor.
- Candidates are responsible for contacting the Intake Pastor with questions regarding their intake status.
- Candidates are not accepted for admission until after completion of a phone interview with the Intake Pastor. Providing false or misleading information may result in denied admission.
- All candidates must resolve all outside issues (debts, business matters, court appointments, etc.) before they arrive.
- It will be at least 60 days before you will be allowed to visit your home. Communication by mail is encouraged. Residents may not receive phone calls.
- Residents may be eligible to participate in the family visitation program only when they
 complete the Awareness Phase of the program (normally eight weeks after admission.)
 Visitors will be limited to legally married spouses and immediate family members. All
 exceptions require the pre-approval of staff.
- No outside work is allowed.
- Personal vehicles are not allowed until the final stage of this program
- Use or possession of any tobacco products is not allowed.

Requirements for Admission

Candidates for admission to the Iron-on-Iron Program must:

- Be male, requesting admission themselves, admitting their addiction problem, and sincerely willing to change
- Agree to abide by all guidelines, fully participate in all aspects of the Christian program, and refrain from any activity staff deems contrary to recovery or Christian growth (Violation of the guidelines may result in disciplinary measures and possible dismissal.)
- Be willing and able to commit to an uninterrupted nine-month program
- Be physically able to perform work assignments such as shop, landscaping, farm, housekeeping, kitchen, or warehouse
- Be medically able to fully participate in a program that does not provide medical care, dental care, or assistance with medications (All candidates must arrange for outside sponsorship before they arrive. Residents may be required to take TB and HIV tests at admission and furnish results upon request.)
- Be mentally stable and capable of functioning in a therapeutic community environment with classroom and group activities (Those who have been diagnosed with a mental illness are required to provide a statement from their mental health professional, stating that the client is mentally stable enough to enroll in a drug and alcohol recovery program in a dormitory setting. The applicant must also have 30 days of medication upon entering the program.)
- Be willing to refrain from the pursuit of romantic relationships other than with a legally married spouse while in the program
- Not be a registered sex offender

Personal Items

Residents are allowed to have those items staff deems conducive to recovery and Christian growth. Residents are not allowed to have more than \$20 in their possession and should make arrangements for off-premise staff storage of cash and valuable before arrival. Residents may arrange for their supporters to send them a maximum of one money order (not cash) per week for amounts under \$20 for miscellaneous items, snacks, etc.

Residents are not allowed to have radios, tape players, CD players; phones; paging devices; facial or body jewelry; or non-approved medications. Non-perishable snack items may be allowed but must be kept in sealed one-gallon Zip-loc bag. Candidates should bring as many of these items as possible, but not exceed limits. Excess items will not be stored.

Permissible items include:

- Two suits, one sport coat
- Eight pairs of pants
- Eight shirts
- Eight undershirts/T-shirts
- Eight pairs of underwear
- Eight pairs of socks
- Four pairs of shoes
- One overcoat
- Two jackets
- Three sweaters

- One laundry bag
- One book bag
- One alarm clock
- Bible, pens, pencils, paper, and notebooks
- Personal hygiene items (not containing alcohol)
- Laundry detergent
- One-gallon Zip-loc bag for snacks, miscellaneous personal effects or recreational items that are conducive to recovery and Christian growth

Mental and Medical Health

Memphis Union Mission is not a hospital or mental health facility nor does it provide these services to our clientele. Memphis Union Mission pastors are not licensed or certified in psychiatry, psychology or social work. Our pastors are ministers of the Gospel, empowered by the Holy Spirit of God to teach the inspired Word of God to clients in order to effect positive, permanent godly behavior and to apply the Word of God to every area of their lives. (1 Peter 4:3; 2 Timothy 2:15; Philippians 4:13)

DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES

Placing a Client on Discipline

Most drug and alcohol programs have a set of rules to which clients are expected to adhere. Memphis Union Mission has designated seven rules for which there are strict guidelines for immediate dismissal from our programs. These are:

- Use of drugs or alcohol after entry into our programs
- Tampering with the integrity of our drug testing procedure
- Theft of property
- Threats or acts of violence
- Failure to comply with requirements for passes
- Acting inappropriately toward volunteers or other clients
- Romantic relationships other than with your legally married spouse

If you break these rules, you will be dismissed from the Iron-on-Iron program for a period of nine months. This one-year period may be ameliorated if you step forward and confess breaking these rules. In such cases the waiting period for readmission to our programs will be six months.

There are other infractions which are of a more minor nature, but those rules are just as important to the smooth operation of our programs. Repeated violations of these rules are grounds for discipline, short of dismissal from the program.

Red Strikes and Yellow Strikes

For the purposes of the discipline of clients there will be two classifications of incidents which require written reports to be included in clients files:

- **Red Strikes**: These are limited to reported violations of the Mission's tobacco-free policy, whether they were the result of your own admission or whether they were discovered through nicotine test. A report of these incidents will be included in your file on a red or pink sheet of paper.
- Yellow Strikes: These include any other violations of Mission rules which require a written report by a pastor or supervisor. A report of an incident of this nature will be included in your file on a yellow sheet of paper. If any rule violations are not reported over a period of 30 days, a yellow strike will be removed from your record. If you have more than one yellow strike, the oldest yellow strike will be removed after 30 days of the most recent rule violation. After an additional 30 days of good behavior in which you haven't violated any rule, the next yellow strike will be removed.

Implementing Discipline in the Iron-On-Iron Program

In order to graduate from the introductory phase (Green Band) of this program, you must be nicotine-free for a period of five consecutive days. If at the end of 14 days as a Green Band you still aren't nicotine-free, you will be dismissed from the program.

In order to graduate from the Awareness Phase to the Calvary Colony phase, you must be nicotine free for a period of 23 consecutive days, and not have a yellow strike in your file for 14 consecutive days.

If you test positive for nicotine in the Awareness program, you will be given additional opportunities to become nicotine-free for the required 23 consecutive days. However, if at the end of 45 days in Awareness you still aren't nicotine free, you will be dismissed from the program and required to wait three months before being considered for re-admission to the program.

Upon graduation to Calvary Colony, the staff at that facility will have the option of cancelling any or all strikes earned in the Awareness Program and allowing you to start afresh. However, accumulating three active strikes while at Calvary Colony will be cause for immediate dismissal from the program.

TOBACCO-FREE POLICY

On June 30, 2005, Memphis Union Mission was designated as tobacco free. This means that the use of any tobacco product (cigars, cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, etc) by anyone is prohibited on most properties owned or controlled by Memphis Union Mission.

It also means that in order for you to join the alcohol and drug program it will be necessary to test negative for the use of nicotine.

- 1. The only place on property owned or controlled by Memphis Union Mission where smoking is permitted will be the "Transient Patio" at 383 Poplar Ave. Smoking anywhere else on Memphis Union Mission property is not permitted. Clients enrolled in the Iron-On-Iron Program are not allowed on the patio.
- 2. Memphis Union Mission has limited tolerance for those who continue to smoke after joining our drug and alcohol program. Each program pastor has resources approved by the American Lung Association and American Cancer Society and other tobacco-free advocacy organizations which will enable you to live smoke free.
- 3. If you continue to smoke after being admitted to the program, you will come under a unique disciplinary procedure. If you violate the non-smoking policy, you will be assessed "strikes". One strike is assessed in each of the following violations:
 - A. Being observed smoking by a pastor or building supervisor If you are written up for this violation, you will be exempt from random nicotine tests for five days.
 - B. Testing positive for nicotine on a random or scheduled tests If you are observed smoking after these tests, you will be charged with an additional strike.
- 4. If you've accumulated three strikes for smoking, you will be dismissed from the Mission's alcohol and drug programs.
- 5. As you progress through the alcohol and drug program and go to another location, you must first test negative for nicotine for five consecutive days before being promoted to the Awareness Program, and 23 consecutive days before being promoted to Calvary Colony.
